

Heather thanks the unit staff for much of what she has gotten back.

"They are all fantastic," she says. "The nurses should be extremely proud of themselves. The therapists should be extremely proud of themselves. Actually, everyone, from volunteers to housekeeping to the dieticians... They should all be congratulated on the work they do. It is an unbelievable program."

Her one regret is that she doesn't have as much movement in her left hand as she once did. But her time at In-Patient Rehab has helped strengthen her will as well as her body. She has a new attitude in life.

"If it doesn't work today," she announces, "it doesn't mean that it won't work tomorrow."

And with the success of Heather's recovery so far, there is no reason to doubt her.

## From physio to freedom:

## A journey of recovery made possible by donors

PRHC nurse Heather Richardson was just one hour into her shift in Orthopedics when she suffered a major stroke. In just minutes she went from helping patients to being a critically ill one herself

"I came in for a 12-hour shift." she recalls. "It ended up lasting three and a half months."

The stroke stole the use of Heather's entire left side, leaving her limbs completely flaccid and her mind shaken. Her recollection of events is fractured.

"I've asked my husband about my time in Emergency and the first few days that I spent in Intensive Care," she says. "He just smiles and reminds me about how far I've progressed since then."

After three days, she was moved to the In-Patient Stroke Rehabilitation Unit. It was merely the first step in a long

At the time, she stubbornly held out hope that her stay would be a short one that she'd be home

within a week. It was Rehab staff that persuaded her differently. "They explained it would

probably be at least 3 months," she admits. "And, boy, did that sound like an awfully long time."

But the stay was worth it. Under the supervision of therapists and nurses, Heather worked hard. She struggled and

fought her body and mind back to health. She was given the best therapy available, with all new equipment. She was given a second chance.

"Two years ago, I couldn't move the left side of my body," she explains. "Look at me now."

Now, she is independent and driving – an act she will never

Expenditures are then made from the earnings while the principal remains intact. The funds are generally held in perpetuity, supporting and sustaining the hospital for generations to come.

At the end of the fiscal year,

the Foundation had \$686,846 in endowed funds and had achieved a 10.8% return versus 9.5% for the market benchmark.



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## Your gifts at work: the impact of your support

This year, the Board of the PRHC Foundation disbursed more than \$2,244,568.00 for new hospital equipment and technology. Thanks to your generosity, this represents a major investment into local public health care. The following are just some of the ways we put your gifts to work.

## **Highest Priority Equipment**

Rapidly changing technologies and increased patient demand mean that there is an ever-present need for increased funding for hospital equipment.

Investments were made in units across the hospital including Pediatrics, Palliative Care, Emergency Department, Surgical Services, Laboratory, Rehabilitation and more.

## 2010/11 Highest Priority Equipment funds were used to purchase:

- Fetal heart monitors and an infant ventilator for the Special Care Nursery that will allow for a safer environment for newborns. Previously, the Nursery could only ventilate one infant at a time. Having two will allow the unit to treat and support twins and multiple newborn patients at once.
- A newly landscaped courtyard and physiotherapy equipment that will greatly improve In-Patient and Out-Patient recovery from illness and injury.
- Four sleeper chairs that will increase comfort and hospitality for family members wishing

- to remain at the bedside with their loved ones in the Palliative Care Unit.
- Five Roho mattresses for Palliative Care that ease pain, discomfort and health complications such as bed sores and respiratory problems.

## Em*Urgency* Campaign

As the largest hospital in the region, PRHC provides expert critical and emergency care to seriously ill and injured patients from across Peterborough County and beyond.

In order to meet the needs of these patients, we have invested \$651,000 in urgent care equipment.

The PRHC Foundation places a priority on providing urgent care equipment and will maintain a continuing focus on urgent care fundraising efforts over the coming years.

## 2010/11 Em*Urgency* Campaign funds were used to purchase:

- Four electrocardiograph (ECG) machines that enable timely diagnosis of heart problems including heart attacks to enable life-saving care and procedures.
- Complete joint surgery tools (two 'stryker power saw' systems) that will enable PRHC to perform over 600 total joint procedures per year, allowing patients to regain mobility and freedom from pain sooner.
- An oscillating ventilator that will keep critically ill and injured patients breathing while emergency care is provided.

- A laboratory coagulation system to perform 60,000 tests per year to diagnose patients with unexpected bleeding, blood clots, and miscarriage, and allow for risk assessment procedures for potential surgeries.
- Operating room stretchers and adjustable operating room tables that will reduce delay and increase timeliness of surgery.

## Closer Campaign

PRHC currently provides an extensive spectrum of top-notch cancer care, from screening and diagnosis to surgery, chemotherapy and palliative care.

Continued investment is required to maintain rapid turnaround times for crucial test results, and ensure timely access to life-saving procedures and treatment.

Our \$2.5 million Closer campaign fundraising goal includes \$1 million for laboratory and surgical equipment to increase accuracy and reduce turnaround times for crucial test results. \$1.5 million

will be used to bring life-saving radiation treatment to Peterborough for 400 of the 1,300+ patients that are currently travelling as far afield as Oshawa, Toronto, or Kingston to receive it.

In October 2010, we asked the community to help bring cancer care closer to home by "raising your hand if you've been affected by cancer." By the end of the fiscal year, we had raised \$1,277,000, over half of the entire campaign goal.

#### 2010/11 Closer campaign funds were used to purchase:

 A new tissue processor that will allow for rapid and accurate cancer diagnosis. Last year PRHC performed over 100,000 tests on tissue samples – a large portion of which were cancer investigations. New equipment will process these tests more quickly for timely diagnosis and access to cancer treatment.
